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INTRODUCTION

The Bible is God's inspired Word for people to learn about Him, His ways and how we can know Him and relate to Him. Christians need to feed on the Word of God in order to grow in their faith and relationship to God. Jesus said, "Man shall not live on bread alone, but on every word that comes from the mouth of God" (Matthew 4:4). The Apostle Peter echoes this call when he urged his readers to be "like newborn babies, (who) crave pure spiritual milk, so that by it they may grow up in their salvation" (1 Peter 2:2). The pure spiritual milk is the Bible.

This series focuses on the foundational truths about God and the principles that will help every serious follower of Jesus to know Him, grow in spiritual depth and to make Him known. As you progress in this series, you will discover about growth principles, discipleship, and helping others to know Jesus and to grow in Him.

The best way to benefit from these Bible studies is to study the chapters regularly. Many have found completing a chapter a week manageable. You will benefit more by personally answering the questions before meeting with your Bible study leader for discussion and clarification. He or she will treasure your discoveries. If time is an issue, do a section (sub-topic) of the chapter each time and discuss your discoveries subsequently.

It is important at the onset to know that knowing truths is only half the story. The other important principle is to relate the truths to your personal life. This is usually addressed at the end of each chapter. Head knowledge does not lead to life change.

As you do the studies, you are also learning how to do systematic Bible study. The content will also gradually increase in depth as you continue the process. As you grow and mature, our eventual desire is that you would be ready to do independent Bible study. Subsequent materials will help you reach this goal.

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CHAPTER 1 JESUS IS FULLY HUMAN

The Bible records the birth, life and death of Jesus Christ. The original eye-witness accounts of his life are recorded in four 'gospels' (literally 'good news') which came to be included in the canon of the New Testament. He was no disembodied spirit nor angelic being. His purpose was to be the redeemer of all mankind. (This will be explored further in the chapter following). The fact of his humanity bridges the gulf between God and man. Let us explore more of who this person Jesus was like. A sample answer is given for Question 1.







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CHAPTER 2 THE DEITY OF JESUS CHRIST

In Chapter 1, we understand that Jesus had human nature. Now we will discover that Jesus also has another nature. We begin by noting the unusual names and titles given to Him by God, by angels, by people as well as by what he called Himself. They include:

God Saviour ('Jesus' itself means 'Saviour')


Son of Man Messiah ('Anointed One'), translated as 'Christ'

Son of God Son of David Lord Word of God

All the names have a common characteristic; they all point to His divine nature. In this chapter we will study His divine attributes and His relationship to God the Father.

What were some 'God-Acts' of the many miracles that Jesus performed to show He is God?



These miracles by themselves were significant. But seen in the Jewish context, they are even more significant. These point to works done by the long-expected Messiah who was God's Chosen One to deliver Israel and the world from their sins and sufferings. This was what Jesus proclaimed at the onset of His ministry in Luke 4:18-21. The source of the quotation Jesus used was Isaiah 61:1-2 in the Old Testament, a prophecy of the Messiah's future ministry actualised by Jesus.

The Scriptures affirm that Jesus was both 100% God and 100% human. In kind of a similar way we talk about the living Word and the written word both having these properties of humanity and deity; the written word is both 100% the word of God and the word of human authors, the word of men. But even more in a more precise way the Christ the person Jesus Christ of Nazareth was in His person 100% God in His nature and 100% divine in nature. So He had two natures in one person

Conclusion

We thus conclude that Jesus is fully man, manifesting the traits of a human being, but with the unique difference that He was sinless. He also manifested the traits of God, like being eternal, having the same authority and powers as God the Father. He was fully God. He was both God and man in a human body, the incarnation of God in human flesh.

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CHAPTER 3 THE WORK OF JESUS CHRIST

The Works of Jesus

Jesus had a public ministry over three years. He walked extensively over the land of Israel. Wherever He went, He brought His disciples with Him. He taught them, He taught the crowds, performed miracles, and healed many diseases.

Jesus was a great Teacher. He was a called a Rabbi, one respected for being well-versed in the Word of God. His major discourses are recorded in the Gospels. The Gospel of Matthew, for example, records five discourses, one of which is the Sermon on the Mount (Matthew 5-7).

Jesus also taught the crowds who followed Him. After performing a miracle of feeding 5000 people, He taught the crowds about Himself being the Bread of Life (John 6:35).

Finally, Jesus spent much time with His disciples and taught them about God, relating to God in obedience, servanthood, following Him in discipleship, etc. In John's Gospel, Chapters 13 to 17 are devoted to what Jesus did and taught His disciples on the night before He was betrayed.

The Apostle John wrote very selectively about seven miracles which Jesus did. He also wrote that "Jesus performed many other signs in the presence of his disciples, which are not recorded in this book" (John 20:30).

Heavenly Father,

I thank you for drawing me to Yourself. I admit I am a sinner and deserve your judgment (Pause, and if God speaks to you about specific sins, admit them before God by name). Thank you for your forgiveness. I believe that you sent the Lord Jesus Christ to die on the cross for my sins. I confess that Jesus is God and I ask Him to enter my life as my Lord and Saviour. I desire to follow and love Him as my Lord. Amen

Assurance


When we are new in a relationship, many things are uncertain. But with God, if you have decided to believe and follow Him, these are the certainties:

- What right (relationship) does faith in Jesus confer on a person?

Christ as Saviour and Lord

When we are first introduced to the Jesus Christ, we are generally focussed on Jesus as Saviour since salvation from sin is our great need. However, the saviourhood of Christ can never be separated from the lordship of Christ. If we accept Him as Saviour, we must also acknowledge Him as Lord.




Jesus is not Savior or Lord. Jesus is Savior and Lord.
